Expectations for Reading in Reception

In School

- 1:1 reading with class teacher and other adults
- Daily whole class story times
- Big books and shared books used as part of class teaching
- Reading scheme books chosen by class teacher through careful assessment of your child's reading ability
- Class library time
- Class teacher to monitor reading diaries regularly

At Home

As a minimum,

- . Every Monday your child will be given 2 reading scheme books to be read at home during the week
- Every Friday your child will be given 1 reading scheme book to read at home over the weekend

We would like you to read with your child every night working through the key elements (see below) over the course of the week. Please write a comment in your child's reading diary each night. The comments will help us know which part of the book your child has read up to and if they require any further support with any sounds or words. The reading diary should be used as a log of your child's reading only – any other messages that need to be passed onto the class teacher should not be recorded here.

Key Elements:

- Discuss the title, front cover and blurb (the information on the back cover) and predict what the book might be about.
- Discuss the meaning of any words and vocabulary that your child is unfamiliar with and explain their meaning.
- Your child should read the book, sounding out any unknown words using 'pure sounds' (for further information please refer to our phonics guidance).
- Your child should look out for any tricky words (e.g. said, my, no) and attempt to read these on sight as these are not able to be sounded out.
- Your child should re-read the story and ask them questions to check their understanding of characters, plot and setting.
